INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the *Deutsche Sommerschule*! We have tried to anticipate your questions about the academic program and the general living arrangements at the school. If you still have questions after reading this brochure, please do not hesitate to contact us. You can find our contact information on the inside of the front cover.

A note on **GERMAN ONLY**

Although this material is in English, from the time you arrive at the Black Range Lodge until the time you will leave, you will be speaking, hearing, reading, and writing German only!

German is our language of communication, not just in classes, but all the time. It is imperative for your own sake and for the other students that you abide by our German-only principle. The total immersion approach only works if all participants speak German. You will be asked to sign a pledge to speak only German.

We presume you are attending the German Summer School in order to improve your German, and we want to take every opportunity to help you achieve this goal. Faculty and Teaching Assistants will speak German with you at all times: during classes, meals, on hikes, while playing volleyball, etc. Although only speaking German will help you to become more fluent, you also want to become more correct in your use of the language. This means expanding your vocabulary and learning to avoid common grammatical, structural, and idiomatic mistakes. Do not take offense if faculty members occasionally correct you.

Try to learn new vocabulary! The faculty will gladly teach you the necessary German words for hiking, dancing, eating and undertaking other common activities at the school. We hope you will take advantage of these opportunities to increase your language competence.

ARRIVAL, DEPARTURE, TRANSPORTATION

The Summer School officially begins at 5:00 pm on Tuesday, June 03. Check-in time starts at 2 pm that day. You should plan to arrive early enough to have time to move into your room.

For those arriving in private cars: Note that Kingston, NM is located about 40 miles southwest of Truth or Consequences. From Albuquerque, take I-25 South to NM Highway 152. Go about 27 miles West on 152 until you reach the Black Range Lodge. You will pass through the small town of Hillsboro. Nine miles further, bear right onto Main Street, Kingston. The Lodge is ahead on the left.

The trip from Albuquerque to Kingston takes about 3 hours.

For those flying or taking the train or bus, please plan to arrive at the Albuquerque airport between 12 and 12:30pm at the very latest. We will try to arrange carpooling.

You should have sent us your complete travel information on the confirmation form, indicating whether you need transportation from Albuquerque to Kingston, NM. **If anything changes, please let us know (949-468-7881; jwilby@unm.edu). Also, please include a cell number where you can be reached.**

If you arrive by bus or train, you will have to take a taxi or the city bus to the airport.

All students who attend the second half of the program should plan to arrive in Kingston no later than 5:00 pm on June 18.

DEPARTURE:

The School officially closes after breakfast on Friday, July 04. Please note: **To receive full credit for Summer School course work, you must remain in residence until the official closing of the school.**

Remember, the trip from Kingston to Albuquerque takes around 3 hours. Please book your return flight for departure from Albuquerque ON **JULY 04 IN THE AFTERNOON.**

THE BLACK RANGE LODGE

Rooms and Roommates

On the application form you indicated your specific housing preferences (double occupancy or single room). We will do our best to meet your request, but for logistical reasons we cannot guarantee it.

Blankets, linen, and towels are supplied. You are responsible to keep your room clean and leave the room in the same condition as you found it upon arrival.

Water in Kingston is a very precious commodity. Please help to conserve water.

Laundry: The Black Range Lodge is equipped with three washers, and two dryers, plus clotheslines. Laundry can be done at the Lodge for a modest fee (no coins needed; no charge for using the clothesline instead of dryer). The nearest Laundromat is in Truth or Consequences (40 minute drive).

Room Damage

All participants must submit a credit card for potential room damage. If there is any damage or breakage, *room occupants will be billed for repairs.* The most serious problems in the past have been food, drink, and ink stains on carpets and bedspreads. Please remember that we are guests and treat your room with care. If you need additional items or repairs in your room, please talk to hotel personnel.

Meals and Special Diets

All meals are prepared “family-style,” and it will not be possible to prepare meals individually. Every effort will be made to accommodate reasonable requests if these are known to us in advance. You indicated meal preferences on your confirmation form.

Please note: We cannot supply vegetarian or special dietary meals on an occasional basis. If you choose a special diet option you must have it at all meals. Since food is ordered and meals are planned well in advance, last-minute adjustments are not possible. If you would like to change your preference, please let me know by Monday, May 19.

Your room and board fee covers three meals a day. No refunds are given for meals not taken. Please help to make our chef’s job easier (and help us to avoid wasting food) by indicating on the sign-out sheet if you will be absent for breakfast, lunch or dinner. Also, please be prompt for meals.

Please do not take dishes, glasses, coffee cups, etc. outside the dining room.

Cars/Transportation

You will not need a car to attend the program. However, you may want to consider bringing your car to go into town or to go on short excursions on days off.

Computers

The Black Range Lodge is equipped with wireless internet access in public areas and most private rooms.

You are encouraged to bring your own laptop. In addition, there will be a small computer lab with a printer for all students and faculty to use.

First aid care is available in Kingston via local First Responders. Dialing 911 will alert Sierra County Dispatch for medical emergencies, and they will call emergency vehicles for transportation to the hospital in Truth or Consequences. Please confirm that you utilized the program confirmation form to advise us if you have any health conditions that might require special attention. If you would like to update your confirmation form information, please contact me (jwilby@unm.edu).

Please remember that our school is situated in mountainous terrain. As beautiful as the surroundings are, they can also be very dangerous. Thunderstorms are likely in summer.

Some hiking trails are rocky, so proper shoes should be worn. And of course, it is possible to get lost in the mountains. Never hike alone! Take adequate clothing, plenty of water, and sunscreen with you when you hike.

Sign-Out Sheet

Please be sure to sign out if you leave for a longer period of time, such as on a hike or a trip to Truth or Consequences (TorC). The German Summer School will not take responsibility for injuries suffered during activities not organized or sponsored by the School.

Guests

We regret that due to space limitations and in the interest of maintaining our German-only atmosphere, private guests cannot be accommodated at the Summer School.

Mail, Shopping, Telephones, and Cell Phones

Mailing address: See inside front cover.

Post Office: There is a post office in Hillsboro, open from 10am-2pm M-F, and 10- 12pm Saturday. Hillsboro is 9 miles away, about a 15 minute drive. Stamped letters can be mailed from the Lodge mailbox.

Telephones: There are no pay phones in the Lodge. Families may of course call the Lodge in an emergency.

Cell Phones: Most cell phone companies DO NOT provide service in Kingston, but there are some spots where spotty service can be found. WIFI calling is possible.

What to Bring

Informal clothing. The only events that call for dress attire are the Früh-schoppen and the closing dinner. Bring some clothes for hiking, sturdy shoes, clothes for excursions in the sun, at the beach (lake), swimming and in the evening (jacket).

Recreational equipment. The German Summer School organizes hiking and other excursions. Please consider bringing your own equipment for other sports or free-time activities.

Musical instruments. Music plays an important role at the Summer School; in the past we have had classical, rock, and jazz performances. Please bring your instrument as well as your favorite music for dancing.

Money. The room and board fee covers all meals, picnic lunches for excursion days, and lodging for the duration of the school.

Tuition and fees do NOT cover text book expenses and optional expenses such as the Goethe-Institut exam fee or costs of excursions.

Prices for Goethe exams:

Goethe-Zertifikat B1—\$120*

Goethe-Zertifikat B2—\$135*

Goethe-Zertifikat C1—\$150*

Prices for textbooks: textbook for language class: between \$30 and \$45 (depending on your level); textbooks for other classes: between \$0 and \$20.

In addition, you should bring money for personal expenses, including excursions. There is no ATM machine in Kingston. Please note that neither the Summer School nor the hotels are in the position to cash personal checks.

Textbooks, Goethe exams and extra costs associated with excursions can be paid via cash, check or venmo/paypal.

Kingston, NM

Kingston, NM and the Black Range Lodge are at an altitude of ~6,000 feet. You may feel the altitude at first if you are unaccustomed to it, and may even experience a mild form of altitude sickness. The best remedy is to take it easy at first: try to get plenty of sleep and drink lots of water. Please make sure to bring a water bottle.

As for the weather, expect high temperatures in the 90s, cooler nights and no humidity. Summer can bring rain and thunder storms in New Mexico.

Insurance and Health Care

You must be covered by health and accident insurance during your stay. Students who do not have insurance from home or school may purchase student insurance through the University of New Mexico.

ADMISSIONS, REGISTRATION, PAYMENT

Admission:

Regular UNM students (including graduate students enrolled in UNM's M.A. Program) may skip to below (Registration). Students returning to the Summer School may skip to below (Returning Students).

All other students must submit the online non-degree application form. Your non-degree application is necessary to create an account in the UNM computer system. With this account you can register for classes and pay for tuition, fees, and room and board.

Instructions:

1. Please select "Albuquerque Campus Application", then use the Non-Degree Application link, create an account, and start your application.
2. Select "Albuquerque Non-Degree" as application type and "Summer 2024" as enrollment term, and fill out all required information.
3. Pay the \$10 non-degree application fee online when you submit the form.
4. Send an email to jwilby@unm.edu after your online non-degree application has been submitted, so that we can follow up with UNM Admissions.

All students must create a Net ID and password in order to verify their registration, monitor their account balance, and pay for program costs and fees due.

Once your non-degree application has been processed by the UNM Admissions Office, you will be able to create a UNM NetID and password. The NetID will give you access to various systems at UNM (e.g. for registration and payment). To create a NetID, go to <https://netid.unm.edu> and follow the instructions. You will not be able to create your NetID until the Admissions Office has set you up in the database via the non-degree application.

Returning students: If you have been at the German Summer School before and do not remember your NetID, please call IT Customer Support Services at 505-277-5757. If you remember your NetID but not your password, please go to <https://netid.unm.edu> and follow the instructions there.

Registration:

Registration for classes will take place at the summer school after placement evaluation, course introductions, and advisement on Wednesday, June 03 (June 18 for second-half students). This will ensure that you are placed in the proper courses. We recommend that you do not sign up for classes until after advisement. If you have to register for classes before then, please contact the German Summer School at jwilby@unm.edu or 949-468-7881.

How many classes will I sign up for?

Full-time undergraduate students may take up to seven credit hours, graduate students six. Half-time students may take three to four credit hours.

GRMN 370, 410 or 470 (*Sprachkurs*, required of all undergrad. students) 2 credits

GRMN 380/481/581 (*Grundkurs*, required of all students) 2 credits

Two 1-credit-hour seminars 2 credits

One additional 1-credit-hour seminar or workshop (optional) 1 credit

How can I monitor and verify my registration?

- 1) Login to <http://my.unm.edu> using your NetID and Password
- 2) Click on the “Student Life” tab
- 3) Click on the red “LoboWeb” link in the middle of the page
- 4) From the “Student Menu”, choose “Registration & Records”
- 5) Under “Student Schedule” choose “Concise Student Schedule”
- 6) From the “Select a Term” drop down option, select “Summer 2025”; submit

The page will display the courses for which you are registered at UNM.

****Please check your enrollment status a few days after the start of classes and let me know about any errors or omissions!!**

Payment:

The payment deadline for full-time and first-half German Summer School students is June 17, 2025. Late fees will be applied to your student account after the deadline.

If you decide not to attend, you will have to drop your classes by the end of the first week of the summer school in order to receive a tuition refund. No refunds or credits for tuition will be issued after this deadline.

To find out what you owe, you can access the UNM Account Suite online, or you can call UNM’s Bursar’s Office at (505) 277-5363.

The UNM Account Suite allows you to view your bill online and make automatic payments, using your bank account or credit card, and set up authorized users to make payments to your account. However, a 2.85% service fee will be assessed on all credit and debit card payments processed by TouchNet via their PayPath service. The University of New Mexico does not receive any proceeds from this service fee.

HOW TO ACCESS THE UNM ACCOUNT SUITE:

- 1) Log in to <https://my.unm.edu> using your UNM NetID and password
- 2) Click on the “Student Life” tab, then click on the red “LoboWeb” link
- 3) From the “Student Menu”, select and click on “Make Payments...”
- 4) On the next page, click the “UNM Account Suite” button.

Your total payment due consists of tuition, program fees, and room & board charges, minus applicable scholarship money. Not all of these charges/credits will appear on your account at once, in which case you can either wait and pay the total once all charges/credits show on your account, or pay only the current charges and check back later to pay the remainder. Your scholarship will be credited to your account after you are enrolled in your courses.

If you prefer to pay by check, please make the check payable to the “University of New Mexico” and write your nine digit UNM ID NUMBER ON THE CHECK! If you don’t, the cashier will not know whose account to credit. Your payment due will equal this amount MINUS the \$400 program deposit.

The scholarship money awarded to you will be posted to your student account after the beginning of the program.

If you chose a single room your total cost will increase by \$700.00 (full time) or \$350.00 (half time).

For other payments at the Summer School (e.g. text books, Goethe-Institut exam fee, excursions), be prepared to pay with cash, check, venmo or paypal.

TRANSFERRING COURSE CREDITS FROM THE GERMAN SUMMER SCHOOL

Your course credits from the German Summer School will NOT automatically transfer to your record at your home institution (unless you are a UNM student). If you want to transfer credits please check with your department and/or the registrar’s office at your school to see what their requirements are. In order to request your official transcript from UNM, please go to <https://registrar.unm.edu/transcripts/request-online.html> and follow the instructions.

Graduate Students

Students may pursue graduate work through the German Summer School. Most universities will allow students to participate in non-degree status for one session only, since no more than six credit hours earned in non-degree status are applicable toward most M.A. programs. Once you have been admitted to a graduate program, please consult with your graduate director to find out how many graduate level credits you can transfer from the German Summer School.

You are responsible for knowing and abiding by the general rules and regulations pertaining to graduate study at the University of New Mexico, as well as your degree program's specific academic requirements. You are also expected to be aware of your academic standing at all times.

CURRICULUM

Classes are held five days a week: Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. Meeting times are listed under the individual course descriptions. Wednesdays are reserved for special excursions and activities. Sundays are free for studying and recreation, and extracurricular activities will be offered as well. Please check the *Tagesplan* posted every day in the Lodge for detailed information.

A variety of evening programs are planned: films, lectures, discussions, concerts, parties, etc. Attendance at these events is encouraged, as these events will also help you in your language acquisition process!

The *Sprachkurs* (GRMN 370, 410 or 470) is required of all undergraduate students and most graduate students. The *Grundkurs* (GRMN380/481 & 581) is required of all program participants - see below for more details on each course. In addition, you can choose elective courses to compliment the *Sprachkurs* and the *Grundkurs*. All students will have the opportunity to take a Goethe-Institut language exam at the conclusion of the session: Goethe-Zertifikat B1, Goethe-Zertifikat B2, or Goethe-Zertifikat C1 are available.

Marc-Uwe Kling ist ein vielfach ausgezeichnete deutscher Kinderbuchautor, Komiker, Podcaster und Kleinkünstler, den die Süddeutsche Zeitung als den „neue[n] Überflieger der deutschen Kabarettszene“ bezeichnet. Insbesondere seine selbst eingesprochenen Hörbücher über ein sehr faules und kommunistisches Känguru sind sehr populär im deutschsprachigen Raum. In diesem Kurs werden wir Exzerpte aus seinen *Känguru-Chroniken*, Comics und Kinderbüchern lesen sowie Ausschnitte aus seinen Podcasts und Hörbüchern hören. Wir werden mit seinem Kinderbuch von einem Einhorn, das immer „Nein!“ sagt beginnen und danach das verrückte Känguru etwas besser kennenlernen. Dabei wird es vor allem um Wortschatzerweiterung gehen. Wir werden ebenfalls Exzerpte aus RAF-Manifesten sowie journalistische Texte über die RAF lesen.

Kursaufgaben: kurze schriftliche Beiträge zur Vorbereitung auf die Filmdiskussionen, 1 thematischer Vortrag sowie eine 3-5seitige Abschlussarbeit zum Thema des Vortrags.

Mögliche AutorInnen sind, u.a. Herzogin Anna Amalia, Rahel Varnhagen, Charlotte von Stein, Madame de Staël, J.W. Goethe, G. Herder & G. Forster.

Der im Westen gefeierte und im Osten geächtete Autor, Filmemacher und Shakespeare Übersetzer Thomas Brasch, der dieses Jahr seinen 80. Geburtstag gefeiert hätte, verkörperte mehr als jede/r andere die Gegensätze und Widersprüche, die das geteilte Deutschland während des Kalten Krieges charakterisierten. Sowohl diese Gegensätze als auch die Generationskonflikte seiner Zeit bestimmten sein facettenreiches Leben. In dem Kurs soll es darum gehen, anhand von seinen Filmen *Engel aus Eisen* und *Der Passagier – Welcome to Germany* sowie literarischen Texten, dramatischen Szenen und Gedichten aus seinen wohl erfolgreichsten Werken *Vor den Vätern sterben die Söhne* (1977) und *Kargo. 32. Versuch auf einem untergehenden Schiff aus der eigenen Haut zu fahren* (1977) zu untersuchen, inwiefern die Prosatexte und die Lyrik seinem Anspruch auf eine Literatur gerecht werden, die keinem ideologischen Dogma zu Diensten steht. Aufgrund seiner Nähe zur literarischen Moderne, insbesondere zu dem Schaffen Franz Kafkas, werden wir seine Texte ebenfalls im Zusammenhang mit literarischen Vorbildern diskutieren.
